Lions Conclude 2000 Season with Most Victories in School History

Just Briefly

The Loyola Marymount men's soccer team has concluded its 2000 campaign with a 10-7-1 overall record, establishing a new school record for victories in a season. The Lions, ranked ninth in the Far West region by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America, remained in contention for an NCAA Tournament birth until late in the year, however a season-ending 1-0 loss at Santa Clara on Saturday, Nov. 11 ended any postseason aspirations. Bronco freshman midfielder Kellen Gilmore scored the game's only goal at the 51:03 mark when he collected a pass from junior teammate Anthony Chimienti and fired a shot which deflected off a LMU defender and into the net. Loyola Marymount was forced to play nearly the entire game at Buck Shaw Stadium with only 10 players after junior defender Mark Lackey, making the fourth start of his collegiate career, drew a red card ejection for unsportsmanlike conduct with just 1:07 elapsed on the game clock. The man advantage worked to the home team's advantage as SCU outshot the Lions 15-7. Sophomore forward Arturo Torres took five of the LMU shots, including two on goal. Torres was rewarded for his outstanding season on Wednesday, Nov. 15 when he was named the West Coast Conference co-Player of the Year, the first such honor awarded to an LMU player. In addition, sophomore defender Jeff Kovar and freshman midfielder Michael Erush earned spots on the All-WCC Second Team while three Lions were honorable mention selections.

Up Next

Loyola Marymount is tentatively scheduled to open its 2001 season on Friday, Aug. 31 at home against Air Force in the LMU Fila Cup.

Lions Enjoy Record-Setting Season

The Lions' 10 victories in 2000 established a new school record for wins in a season. The previous best came in 1981, when Loyola Marymount went 9-4-0 and won the Southern California Intrecollegiate Soccer Association title. Loyola Marymount has posted a record of .500 or better in consecutive seasons for the first time in school history. LMU also set an important attendance mark this season, as a capacity and record crowd of 917 fans watched the Lions upset then-eighth-ranked Portland on Oct. 22 at Sullivan Field.

Cardiac Kids

Sudden death meant sudden victory for Loyola Marymount in 2000, as the Lions posted an undefeated 6-0-1 record in overtime games. That included consecutive OT wins over Detroit Mercy and UNLV near the start of the season and a string of three straight victories against San Diego State, UC Santa Barbara and UC Irvine within a six-day span. In WCC play, the Lions defeated Portland in overtime and tied No. 20 San Diego, the only blemish on the Torreros' conference record.

Six Lions Earn All-WCC Acclaim

Along with Arturo Torres' West Coast Conference co-player of the Year award, the sophomore forward earned his second straight All-WCC first team selection. Sophomore Jeff Kovar, who has developed a reputation as tenacious defender who excels at winning head balls, was a second team all-conference pick, following up on his honorable mention recognition in 1999. Joining Kovar on the second team was freshman midfielder Michael Erush, already one of the Lions' vocal leaders, who ranked second on the team with four assists and scored the "golden goal" to defeat Detroit Mercy. Seniors Jerad Bailey and Spencer Reeves capped their four-year LMU careers with All-WCC honorable mention acclaim, the first postseason conference award for each player. Also earning honorable mention recognition was sophomore midfielder Andres Murragui, who scored eight points in 2000 including three goals.

Torres Tops the Charts

In only two years as a Lion, Arturo Torres already holds a combined five single-season and career Loyola Marymount scoring records. During consecutive games against San Diego (Oct. 15) and Portland (Oct. 22), Torres broke Loyola Marymount records for career goals and points; he now has 37 goals and 68 points in just 36 career games. In 2000 the Wilmington, Calif., native showed the ability to pass the ball as well as score with it, as his 10 assists established a new single-season school record and ranked him tied for 18th nationally with 0.56 assists per game. Next on hit list is the all-time mark of 15 assists, which he is only one shy of tying. Torres scored or assisted on 21 of Loyola Marymount's 26 goals this season and tallied three or more points in six different games.

Protecting the Pride

Senior Jerad Bailey was one of the busiest goalkeeper in the country in 2000, ranking sixth in Division I 6.81 saves per game. His total of 109 saves this season exceeded his previous season high by 35. While Bailey faced a ton of shots he didn't let many through, boasting a career best goals against average of 1.41 - over half a goal lower than his 1999 mark. The Redlands, Calif., native shutout four opponents in 2000 to raise his own school record in that category to 14. The Lion defense as a whole has stepped up this year, allowing just 24 goals (1.31 per game).

LMU Head Coach

Paul Krumpke has completed his third season at the helm of the Loyola Marymount men's soccer program, following up 1999's 8-8-3 finish by guiding the Lions to their best record in nearly 20 years. A 1986 graduate of UCLA, Krumpke came to LMU after spending three seasons as an assistant with the Bruins. During those seasons, he helped lead UCLA to a record of 56-9-1, three NCAA regional appearances, three Mountain Pacific Sports Federation titles and a national championship in 1997. As a player for UCLA, Krumpke was a four-year starter (1982-85), co-captain of the 1985 NCAA Championship team and a two-time All-Far West Region selection. He also has extensive international experience, playing in over 40 games with Team USA including the 1988 Summer Olympics.
