Renewed Focus Awaits LMU Basketball in Fresh Start

THE SIMPLE THINGS

The Loyola Marymount basketball team enters the 2000-2001 with a new direction--a new head coach, new uniforms, a new philosophy and a dynamic future--with one common goal: focus on the simple things.

Head coach Steve Aggers comes to LMU fresh off a conference championship run at Eastern Washington University. Eastern captured the Big Sky Conference title with a 12-4 record as Aggers was selected as the conference "Coach of the Year" for the second time in the last three seasons. Aggers and his staff completely turned around the basketball program at Eastern and now bring their talents to Loyola Marymount. Aggers took over at Eastern in 1995 looking at a program that had finished no higher than the #298 on the RPI. He rebuilt the program to a championship level and an RPI as high as #106. This also included three straight years of qualifying for the Big Sky postseason tournament.

"LMU represents an exciting opportunity and a challenge that my staff and I relish," said Aggers. "We jumped in, rolled up our sleeves and have gone to work rebuilding this program. We are building a dream and working together to bring the University, our alumni and the student body a team that they can be proud of and rally around."

Coach Aggers and his staff will have a clean slate to start with, as only two players from the 1999-2000 squad return. "We are in the position to build this program from the ground up and our first season will be concerned with establishing our philosophies," said Aggers. "This is a program with a proud past and we look forward to bringing back the pride in Lion basketball."

"With no practice time and limited contact with our student-athletes it has been difficult getting a handle on what we need to do in improving our team. We will, however, focus on the fundamentals. We will establish a collective work ethic, a collective attitude of 'team first,' and an overall effort in building relationships," said Aggers. "One thing to expect from our team will be that we will play hard, play together and we will be well prepared for each game. We will base much of what we do on defense and rebounding and be a sound and solid team in the fundamentals of the game."

Starting from the ground floor, the Lions' program was left with glaring needs at almost every position. Aggers began the rebuilding process based on players who will be able to adopt the **team first**-work hard philosophy.

"In our first season we will not focus on the winning and losing as much as we will focus on the 'process.' Establishing our philosophy and the way in which we will approach things is of great importance to the success of this program. We have to establish an environment in which our student-athletes will be successful," said Aggers. "If we can work hard daily and concern ourselves with the things we can control, then the success will come. The day-to-day process is important and doing things in the right way with quality is of paramount importance."

STRENGTHS AND A STARTING POINT

The LMU program will have a starting point in its 2000-2001 campaign in the two lone returning seniors in **Pablo Machado (C, 6-10, 235, Sr., Merida, Venezuela)** and **Elton Mashack (F, 6-5, 210, Sr., Walnut, Calif.)**. Machado and Mashack bring West Coast Conference playing experience that will be key to a young squad this season.

"All successful programs begin with quality older players that assume some responsibility for the success of the team," said Aggers. "We will look to Pablo and Elton as senior leaders, but expect every player in our program to lead in some small way."

Mashack struggled early in the 1999-2000 season but rebounded with some very respectable efforts as the regular season ended. He picked up the 11th double-double of his career with 12 points and 14 rebounds (one shy of his career high) in the last month of the season to finish with an average of 11.4 points and 7.1 rebounds per game to lead the Lions. Mashack rated 5th in the WCC in rebounding averaging (7.1 rpg), 12th in scoring (11.4 ppg) and second in offensive rebounds (3.0).

Machado, who will provide the only size up front for the Lions this season, averaged 9.7 ppg and 7.2 rpg. The native of Venezuela who transferred from Georgia Tech two years ago, was 23rd in the league in scoring, third in rebounds per game, fifth with 1.33 blocks per game, third with 2.81 offensive rebounds per game and fifth with 4.50 defensive rebounds per game.

Fresh off their redshirt season, both **Philipp Czernin (G/F, 6-6, 200, Jr., Pacific Palisades, Calif.)** and **Greg Lakey (F, 6-8, 220, Jr., Lynwood, Calif.)** will be called on to provide much needed depth and scoring punch for the Lions. Czernin, who transferred from Hawaii, shot 59-percent from the field for the Rainbows in 1998-99 in starting 18 games. He finished the season with an average of 5.9 points per game in the Western Athletic Conference.

Lakey, a heavily recruited player out of Lynwood High School, where he averaged 23 points and 10 rebounds per game, played two seasons with USC. He started 19 games his freshman season for the Trojans and finished with an average of 5.3 points per game. His versatility will be important to the 2000-2001 Lions.

"Our seniors must be leaders first and foremost through example. Pablo and Elton have both expressed a desire to step up their commitment and leadership with our team. They both worked hard this summer at improving basic skills, conditioning and strength," says Aggers. "These guys have the advantage of game experience in the WCC and know what it will take for us to be improved and successful within our own league. Now we need to get them to be assertive with their leadership, especially with our new guys helping to get everyone on the same page and working together with Lion pride."

BUILDING BLOCKS

"As with any new system there is going to be change. We need to raise the expectations of the players, fans, boosters, alumni, and everyone associated with Loyola Marymount," said Aggers. "We have to raise the standards of the LMU basketball program to achieve our goals."

With the bar raised, Aggers and his staff recognized that "recruiting is the lifeblood of the program." Aggers turned his attention to the talent-rich Southern California area. "We must establish a local recruiting base. We have to recruit the kind of players that meet our philosophy."

"We have to begin our recruiting process with local players that also meet the academic standards we strive for at Loyola Marymount. There are outstanding high school coaches in Southern California, and in the state in gen-

eral. There is no better area in the country to find a student-athlete that meets the work ethic, scholastic and athletic levels we need to institute our philosophy and build a successful program.”

Following that philosophy, the LMU program began the rebuilding with forward **Sherman Gay (F, 6-7, 190, Fr., Carson, Calif.)** from Dominguez High School. Gay averaged 12 points, seven rebounds and five blocks a game for the *USA Today* boys’ basketball National Champions. Gay, a Carson native, was voted to the All-San Gabriel Valley League team in 1999-2000 for the California State Division II championships.

“Sherman brings the winning attitude and a successful past into our program from Dominguez High School. He is an outstanding student and the type of young man we want to build our program with.”

Junior college transfers **Robert Davis (G, 6-2, 195, Jr., Tempe, Ariz.), Marcus Smith (G, 6-0, 180, Jr., Vacaville, Calif.)** and **Eurskine Robinson (G, 6-0, 180, Jr., Palmdale, Calif.)**, along with Gay all fit the standards of the new philosophy of the Lions’ program.

“We were able to fill some immediate needs at the guard position and added young men who we believe are solid students, solid citizens and skilled basketball players.”

Davis, who led the Arizona Community College Athletic Conference in scoring with 26.2 points per game, returns to LMU after departing a year ago. As a freshman at LMU during the 1998-99 season, Davis played in 26 games and averaged seven points per contest. Transferring from Butte College in Oroville, Calif., Smith averaged 13.6 points per game. Robinson also joins the Lions from a California JC, College of the Canyons in Santa Clarita. The Palmdale native finished his sophomore campaign at COC with 230 assists (8.2 per game), the third highest single season total.

The Lions will get a boost from two local kids returning home in transfers **Kent Dennis (G, 6-4, 205, So., Los Angeles, Calif.)** and **Keith Kincade (G/F, 6-6, 195, So., Norwalk, Calif.)**. Following their required redshirt year, the two guards will have an instant impact. Dennis, who recorded 25 points, eight rebounds, six assists and five steals at Grover Cleveland High School, played 19 games for West Virginia last season. He averaged 11 minutes and 3.7 points per game. Kincade, also heavily recruited out of Dominguez High School where he averaged 14 points a game for the 32-3 state champions, played in 20 games for the Mountaineers and averaged 3.2 points per game.

“We are glad they decided to transfer back to Southern California and we look forward to having these tremendous student-athletes for three seasons in addition to their presence at practice this season,” said Aggers.

CONCERNS

The biggest concerns for the Lions will be the lack of depth and size on the front line. A 27-game schedule can become a long season for the Lions, who have only Machado and Lakey lining up for the Lions over 6-7. This will place a great emphasis on the outside shooting of the young group of guards.

Other concerns to the coaching staff is the team’s unfamiliarity with one another and the West Coast Conference competition. With so many new faces and styles, Aggers states that the team must focus on regaining confidence and work toward building relationships with one another on the court through the new philosophy of the 2000-2001 Lions’ program.

“Last season is over and we do not want to look back,” said Aggers.

“Everything we do will be with the thought of moving forward. It is a bright new day and our efforts are directed on building something special at LMU not in focusing on the past. One of our challenges as coaches has been to rebuild damaged self-esteem and getting everyone believing in themselves again. We need to raise our confidence level back to where it needs to be for our success to occur.”

DEMANDING SCHEDULE

The Lions will begin the 2000-2001 campaign against Vanguard University at Gersten Pavilion before embarking on the first of two four-game road trips, this one coming against UC-Irvine, USC, Colorado and Idaho State heading into the month of December. The Lions schedule includes seven NCAA Division I state of California institutions not in the West Coast Conference. In addition to Irvine and USC, the Lions will face Cal State Fullerton, Long Beach State and San Diego State at home and will travel to face Sacramento State and UC Santa Barbara.

“We want to schedule as many local opponents as possible and play within the state. As we establish our recruiting base in this area, it is important to face the top universities of this area and create rivalries the fans will be able to relate to and get excited about.”

The Lions non-conference schedule will also include a trip to Chicago to face Loyola-Chicago on December 21 and a trip to Las Vegas on January 3 to face UNLV. Following the Vegas trip, the Lions will host four in a row, starting with SDSU on the 6th and open conference play against San Diego, Santa Clara and Pepperdine. LMU will then have three conference games on the road, followed by two at Gersten. A four-game road trip to Santa Clara, San Diego, Gonzaga and Portland from February 8-17 will conclude the Lions road trips for the season. They will close at home against San Francisco on February 23 and Saint Mary’s the next night.

“Good players want to play good competition. Our schedule really reflects that this season. The challenging non-league schedule will better prepare us for the demanding West Coast Conference.”

HEAD COACH



Loyola Marymount University Director of Athletics Dr. William Husak announced in April of 2000 that Steve Aggers, the most successful coach in the history of men's basketball at Eastern Washington University, as the 22nd head coach at LMU. And what a job Aggers and his staff will have for the Lions program as it enters its beginning to "a dynamic future."

"Steve has a fantastic record of building and rebuilding programs," stated LMU Director of Athletics William Husak. "He has been successful on every level of the coaching profession, but more importantly his emphasis on academics is very impressive. He also has a very strong and reputable track record in the recruiting arena which is very important to our program."

Aggers, 50, had a phenomenal five-year run at Eastern Washington. Guiding the Eagles to a share of its first Big Sky Conference title in school history in March, EWU finished the season at 15-11 overall and 12-4 in conference play. After accomplishing the school's first conference crown, Aggers was named the Big Sky Conference Coach of the Year, an honor that came on the heels of the prestigious National Association of Basketball Coaches District 13 Coach of the Year award. Aggers joined the company of 14 fellow district winners including the likes of Jim Boeheim (Syracuse), John Chaney (Temple), Mike Krzyzewski (Duke), Billy Donovan (Florida), Bob Huggins (Cincinnati), Tom Izzo (Michigan State), Larry Eustachy (Iowa State), and Mike Montgomery (Stanford).

The winner of more Big Sky conference games than any other coach in Eastern Washington history, Aggers led the Eagles to 32 conference wins in the past four seasons. As a member of the Big Sky Conference since 1984, Eastern had won only 34 games without Aggers as its head coach. Since arriving in Cheney, Wash., in 1995, Aggers took the Eagle basketball program from a power ranking of No.298 to No.106 this past season, its highest ranking in EWU history. He guided Eastern to a 32-46 Big Sky record, and 51-82 overall. In the past three seasons, his teams were 41-40 (.506) and 29-19 (.604) in conference play.

"I am extremely thankful for the opportunity I've been given by Father Lawton, Dr. Lane Bove, and Bill Husak, I see this as a new beginning and a fresh start," stated Steve Aggers. "My staff and I are looking toward a very bright and dynamic future. One of the reasons I accepted this job was the location of the institution, its proud past with a rich athletic tradition, strong academic reputation and the outstanding recruiting base it provides. Our goals and objectives are not to just be competitive, but to build a championship program. This will not be a sprint, but rather a marathon that includes a staff of blue-collar professionals that have a successful history of rebuilding programs at every level. We will begin working toward that end today."

Aggers leaves the Eastern Washington program on solid ground. Well known for his recruiting talents, Aggers signed two Washington State Players of the Year to national letters of intent for the 2000-2001 season (Alvin Snow, the 4A Player of the Year from Franklin High School, and Eddie Lincoln, the 3A Player of the Year from O'Dea High School). It was the first time in school history Eastern Washington had signed a Player of the Year from either of two largest classifications of high school basketball in the state. Aggers also had one academic All-American, 16 Academic All Big Sky selec-

tions and 11 all-conference selections.

"The men's basketball program is an extremely important element of our athletic department, and I am thrilled that we have brought Steve aboard to direct and lead our team," said Husak. "With nearly 30 years of coaching experience, Steve's credentials were very attractive to a place like Loyola Marymount. His dedication to academics as well as his reputation in the coaching community are unparalleled. Steve has an impeccable and accomplished resume, and we're very excited about his arrival."

Aggers began his collegiate coaching career in 1974 when he accepted the duties as head coach at Mid-Plains Community College in North Platte, Neb. Spending four seasons at the school (1974-78), Aggers guided the Knights to three 20-plus winning seasons and captured one league title while ranking among the top 10 programs in the country in team defense. His 1974-75 squad shared the NCCAC conference title.

Moving back to his native Laramie, Wyo., during the 1978-79 season, Aggers accepted his first Division I coaching assignment as an assistant under Jim

Brandenburg. Spending just one season with the Cowboys, Aggers helped Wyoming finish with an overall record of 15-12 and a 5-7 mark (4th place) in the Western Athletic Conference. While in Laramie, Aggers established a strong relationship with fellow assistant Tom Asbury.

Aggers left Wyoming after just one season and accepted his second head coaching position in 1979 at the College of the Great Falls in Great Falls, Mont. Aggers spent six seasons with the program (1979-85) and helped the team amass a record of 120-54 (.689). Posting six-consecutive winning seasons, Aggers guided the team to five post-season playoff appearances and captured three conference titles. Twice earning Frontier Conference Coach of the accolades, Aggers was also tabbed the District 12 Coach of the Year following the 1981-82 season. In addition to his duties as head basketball coach, Aggers served as the director of athletics and also taught a variety of physical education courses.

In 1985, Aggers took over the head coaching duties at Wayne State College in Wayne, Neb. Helping to guide the school through its transition from NAIA to NCAA Divi-

sion II, Aggers quickly rebuilt the program into a winner. He led Wayne State to four post-season appearances during his five-year tenure (1985-90) and earned NAIA District 11 Coach of the Year honors in 1988-89.

Aggers transitioned back into the Division I coaching ranks following his stint at Wayne State. Becoming an assistant under Tom Asbury at Pepperdine in 1990, Aggers spent four successful seasons in Malibu (1990-94). Helping to guide the Waves to three 20-plus winning seasons, Aggers played a major role in guiding Pepperdine to three NCAA Tournament berths and one appearance in the NIT. During the four seasons Aggers spent at Pepperdine, the Waves compiled a record of 88-35, and at one point had built a conference game winning streak of 38 games.

In 1994, Aggers followed Tom Asbury to Manhattan, Kan., when he accepted the head coaching position at Kansas State. Aggers spent only one season with the Wildcats, helping KSU post a record of 12-15. The following year, Aggers accepted the head coaching duties at Eastern Washington University where he was one of the most successful coaches in the program's Division I history.

In addition to his vast array of coaching assignments, Aggers has spent a number of years teaching course work in physical education. Aggers taught classes at Sheridan Junior College (1973-74), Mid-Plains (74-78), Wyoming (78-79), College of the Great Falls (79-85), and at Wayne State (85-90).

A native of Laramie, Wyo, Aggers graduated with a bachelor of science degree in 1971 from Chadron State College in Chadron, Neb. While at the school, he was a four-year letterman on the basketball team and was selected to the Outstanding College Athletes of America as a junior and senior. His senior year, Aggers was named to the Nebraska State College Coaches All-Star squad. He continued his education at the University of Nebraska-Omaha where he earned a master's of science degree in education in 1973.

Aggers has been highly visible in the community during each of his coaching stops. Assisting in fund-raising efforts for the Easter Seals and working with the Nebraska Heart Association, he has also served as a committee chairman for the Montana State Special Olympic Games. One of the 31 voting members on the ESPN/USA Today Coaches poll, Aggers also served as the Big Sky Conference representative on the NABC Division I Congress. Aggers and his wife, Frankie, have a son Erin, 23, and a daughter, Keely, 18.

Assistant Coaches

DAVID CAMPBELL

As one of the college game's top young recruiters, coach David Campbell rejoins head coach Steve Aggers at Loyola Marymount as his top assistant. Campbell and Aggers were assistants together at Pepperdine from 1990-94, where the two helped Tom Ashbury compile a 88-35 record.

Both Aggers and Campbell went to Kansas State with Ashbury. Aggers left after one season to take the position at Eastern Washington. Campbell remained at Kansas State where he used his 17 years of NCAA Division I coaching experience to help the Wildcats to three postseason appearances in his five seasons at KSU.

As Ashbury's top assistant, Campbell inked some of the best recruiting classes in Kansas State basketball history. He will oversee the Lions' recruiting and will handle the development of the frontline players.

"David is one of the best in breaking down the talent of young players," said Aggers. "He is one of the great young minds in this game, and we are fortunate to take on the rebuilding of this program with him on our side."

Prior to his stints at Pepperdine and Kansas State, Campbell was an assistant at Weber State (1987-88) and at Saint Mary's (1981-87), where he played basketball and was named all-conference honorable mention in the West Coast Conference his senior season.

Campbell has a bachelor's degree in business administration and lives in Westchester.

BRIAN PRIEBE

Brian Priebe travels with head coach Steve Aggers to Loyola Marymount University from Eastern Washington University to help rebuild the LMU basketball program. Priebe will be involved with recruiting efforts of the LMU program, a similar role he held at EWU where the Eagles landed for the first time in school history the state of Washington's high school player of the year.

Priebe, who has been with Aggers since the 1995-96 season, will also handle the Lions' scheduling and the academic standards of the LMU players. "Brian has a great feel of the game," said Aggers. "He is very knowledgeable about the game of basketball and his enthusiasm seems to rub off on those around him, most importantly to the players. He is a caring and loyal professional who was very important to our success at EWU. He assists our players to be the best they can be in the classroom and on the court. That is why I would have been very apprehensive about taking the challenge of rebuilding this program without him."

A 1995 graduate of the University of Washington, Priebe spent two seasons (1993-95) as the senior student assistant for UW's head coach Bob Bender at the Pacific-10 school. Following his bachelor's degree in history at UW, he completed his master's degree in athletic administration at EWU in 1997 why serving in his assistants role.

The 27-year-old Priebe and his wife Kristen have a baby girl who will turn one at the start of the season in November. They have recently completed the move from Spokane and will reside in the Westchester area.

BYRON JENSON

Byron Jenson also brings experience in the West Coast Conference to the Lions' program, graduating from Pepperdine in 1993.

Jenson spent two seasons with head coach Steve Aggers at Eastern Washington, helping the Eagles rebuild and claiming the Big Sky championship last season. Jenson will continue to serve in a similar role as at EWU, overseeing the strength and conditioning of the Lions, organizing team travel, and the equipment, facilities and summer camps.

"Byron was a great addition to our staff at Eastern and once again we are in a much better position of rebuilding here at LMU with him on the staff," said Aggers. "He was an outstanding player at Pepperdine and played on conference championship teams and in the NCAA tournament. With that experience in the WCC and nationally, he will bring a perspective to the game that the players will respond to."

In addition to playing nationally, Jenson played international basketball in the Australia's Continental Basketball Association for four seasons, leading the professional league in rebounding in 1995 and was voted a All-Star in 1998.

Jenson played two season at UT-San Antonio before transferring to Pepperdine, where in his senior season was an honorable mention all-WCC selection.

He graduated from Pepperdine in 1993 with a bachelor's degree in public relations.

1999-2000 Season Notes: Elton Mashack struggled early in the season but rebounded with some very respectable efforts as the regular season ended. He picked up the 11th double-double of his career with 12 points and 14 rebounds (one shy of his career high) in the team's 77-65 loss at Saint Mary's. Two weeks prior, he broke out for a career-high 26 points and six rebounds in the team's 95-73 loss at Pepperdine. Mashack nearly double-doubled against Gonzaga, picking up 21 points and nine rebounds. He also totaled 15 points and five boards in the team's one-point loss to Portland. He picked up 15 points and six rebounds at Portland, and he nearly double-doubled at Gonzaga with nine points and seven rebounds. Despite two losses to USF and Santa Clara, he combined for 40 points and 17 rebounds against the Broncos and the Dons. While picking up his third double-double this year and the tenth of his career, he finished with 17 points and 11 rebounds against the Dons. He also shattered his career-high in scoring with 23 points against Santa Clara. Although his scoring has been down this year (shooting just 33.4 percent on the season, 104-311), he grabbed 21 rebounds in two games and finished with 148 in the last 20 (7.1). His play was fantastic in the final 12 games. Mashack's combined for 191 points and 102 rebounds during that stretch. He picked up his second-consecutive double-double this year after finishing with 12 points and 11 rebounds at home against Dartmouth (was the ninth of his career). Mashack rated 5th in the WCC in rebounding averaging 7.1 rpg, 12th in scoring with 11.4 points per game and second with 3.0 offensive rebounds per game. Mashack led the team last year with seven double-doubles, a mark that ranked fifth in school history among sophomores. Mashack was also the team's third-leading scorer a year ago averaging 12.1 ppg, and led the team 13 times in rebounding during the campaign. He scored in double figures in 19 of the team's 27 games and set a career-high in rebounding after hauling in 15 in the team's 73-49 loss at USC on Dec. 9.
